Assessment forms and methods

The university employs a 100-point cumulative grading system to assess students' academic performance.

Ongoing assessment is conducted during lectures, practical sessions, laboratory work, and seminars. Its purpose is to evaluate the student's readiness for specific tasks and is graded based on the total points accumulated:

- Maximum possible score – 60 points
- Minimum required score to be eligible for the final exam – 35 points

Final assessment includes semester control and the certification of the student. Semester control is conducted in the form of a final exam during the examination session.

- Maximum possible score for the exam – 40 points
- Minimum required score to pass the exam – 25 points

The **final grade** for the course is determined by summing the points earned from ongoing and final assessments.
