Forms and methods of assessment

The university uses a 100-point cumulative system for assessing the learning outcomes of higher education applicants.

Current control is carried out during lectures, practical, laboratory and seminar classes and is aimed at checking the level of preparedness of a higher education applicant to perform specific work and is assessed by the sum of the points scored: the maximum sum is 60 points; the minimum sum that allows a higher education applicant to take an exam (exam) is 35 points.

Final control includes semester control and certification of a higher education applicant. Semester control is carried out in the form of a semester exam (exam). The semester exam (exam) is taken during the examination session. The maximum amount of points that a higher education applicant can receive during the exam (exam) is 40 points. The minimum amount at which the exam (exam) is considered passed is 25 points. *The final grade for the academic discipline* is determined by: summing up the points for the current and final control.

Academic discipline policies
